"A Letter from Cedar Glen, Ontario, to the Canadian Association for Physical Anthropology"

Cedar Glen is located only 20 minutes north of Toronto International Airport in picturesque rural Ontario. The area is known locally as the Caledon Hills and is characterized by scenic hills, winding rivers, and small towns. It is an antique hunter's paradise.

Cedar Glen itself is a conference centre run by the United Church. It is run with a Spartan efficiency (no TV, air conditioners, room phones, etc) and a Puritan ethic (no bar, cigarette machines, lust, etc.).
